### WARDEN'S REPORT.

Following a very mild autumn, the winter birds have been fickle in their appearance, however, it did permit an extended flowering of several shingle plants, with Yellow-horned Poppy, Viper's Bugloss and Herb Robert flowering into December!

On the night of 21st November, storm force winds combined with spring tides to severely test the sea defences, much sea water entered the Reserve and altered its character. All the beach hollows were filled with water as was much of the adjacent farmland. At Ternery Pool the water level increased by nearly 2ft., covering most islands and destroying most of the shelter for resting birds. Much of the water is still here at the turn of the year and it seems such a long time ago that the 'drought' of 1984 gave the low water levels that attracted so many waders to Ternery Pool. I shall look forward to the return of the islands.

The notable birds since the last Newsletter are:- Peregrine = 1 during a September Work Party was the first for the Reserve, (as illustrated on the right). Wood Duck = 1 female at Ternery Pool on the evening of 10th December, also another first for the Reserve, but was probably an escape from a wildfowl collection. Hen Harriers = 1 - 2 ringtails (brown) regular. Wryneck = 1 along the footpath from the Caravan Site for a week in September. Goldeneye = up to 3 present at Ternery Pool throughout December. Slavonian Grebe = present throughout October and most of December on the Narrow Pit. Shag = 1 at Ternery Pool on 24th November. Firecrest = almost numerous at end of October.

The bird community on the Reserve changes with the weather and season, so a list is now displayed in the old hide and in the information centre that describes the birds seen in each half month period. I hope this proves valuable when you next visit.

A botanical walk led by Mrs. Brenda Burt will be announced in the next Newsletter.

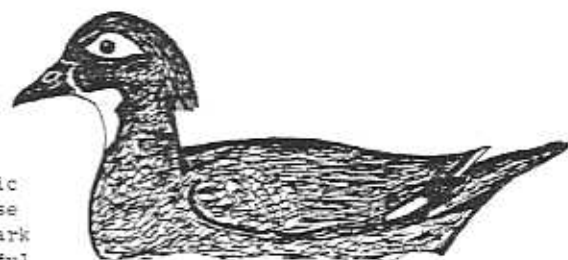

NEW WADER POOL PROJECT.
